## Investing in our future . . . .

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," is a famous quote from the often quoted Benjamin Franklin. I 'Bing-ed' the quote to get an interpretation and wiki.answers.com said, "the meaning, in brief, is that if we prevent a problem from occurring in the first place, it will save a great deal more in time, effort and cost than it would in trying to repair the damage done later because we hadn't paid attention to possible problems earlier." The concept seems simple enough. We use the principle in the operation of the Boys & Girls Club every day, like when we follow a preventative maintenance plan for a piece of expensive equipment. If we regularly service the equipment, it costs a little extra up front, but the equipment runs more efficiently, lasts longer and in turn, saves us money. We are also using the same principle in the construction of the new William N. Pennington Facility on Foster Drive. For example, we know kids are hard on doors. Instead of putting in standard hinges and hardware and replacing them every year, we invest in a continuous hinge that, while it costs more up front, has proven to hold up to the task and rarely needs to be replaced. Again, not overly complicated. In fact, it makes a lot of sense.

That being said, what has happened in our community since the crash of our economy in 2007-2008 is a bit unnerving, especially as it has led to many services to kids in northern Nevada being lost or severely limited. Our educational system has been forced to tighten their belts, which has resulted in reducing extracurricular activities and course offerings. Parks and Recreation leaders have been faced with a series of budget cuts that have forced them to make difficult decisions that have led to the loss or reduction in youth programs. Most devastating has been the loss of youth serving non-profits like the YMCA, an organization that for over 50 years served thousands of families throughout the region. All of these challenges have had negative effects on our community, and in particular, our youth. Their absence threatens to derail the development of some youth into well-educated, productive citizens of our community. Development that if lost could prove extremely costly to our society and future generations.

While no one agency can fully fill the void created by these losses, the collaboration between the City of Reno, the William N. Pennington Foundation, many other local foundations and the Boys & Girls Club will make strides to bring out-of-school opportunities back to the neighborhood on Foster Drive. At the Pennington Facility, youth will be able to find homework help and academic support, sports leagues, leadership clubs, nutritious meals, mentoring and much more. While we know it will take time and effort from many in the community to fully recover, the Boys & Girls Club is prepared to stand alongside our friends, neighbors and leaders to draw a line in the sand for the loss of services for our youth.

As you read through the Club Chronicle today, see how your donations allow us to offer a myriad of programs and activities that help develop our youth into confident, responsible individuals who can make educated, healthy decisions. An ounce of prevention . . . . . An investment in our future.

In spring 2014, the Boys & Girls Club of Truckee Meadows opens the new William N. Pennington Facility located on Foster Drive in Reno. The 55,000-square foot facility serves the needs of the immediate southwest Reno neighborhood and nearby schools. The facility expects to serve more than 3,000 youth annually through a variety of programs and services.

Through the Club's Brick-by-Brick fundraising campaign, everyone can be part of the new Pennington Facility. For as little as \$100, individuals and companies can buy a brick for the new facility that includes a custom engraved message. Honor a family member or recognize a company name, each brick is unique to its owner. These bricks line the entrance to the new facility and serve as a lasting reminder to everyone of who supports the Boys & Girls Club of Truckee Meadows.

Proceeds from the Brick-by-Brick Campaign directly support the new facility. Brick options include: Gold Level at \$500 per brick (bricks make up the signature Boys & Girls Club "hands" logo); Silver Level at \$250 per brick (bricks make up the area around the "hands" logo); and Bronze Level at \$100 per brick (bricks make up the remainder of the walkway).

First, teams were challenged to present their robot designs by explaining concepts for building their robots and what lead them to select certain pieces. Second, they presented their research projects which dealt with issues of natural disasters. Each team presented what disaster they chose to research and what problems related to that disaster. They were judged on innovation and creativity. They were also judged on the quality of their research and their ability to creatively present their work as a team. Thirdly, teams were judged on their core values and how they incorporated core values as a team. Judges kept an eye out during the competition to observe how teams were working together and utilizing the FLL core values. Finally, teams competed on the Nature's Fury Challenge board in which the robots they created during the semester were put to the final test and accomplish their missions.

During the event, kids were mentored by professionals in a variety of different fields related to disaster preparedness and relief and were encouraged to further their growth in technology fields. Each team member received a medal of participation in the FLL season during the closing ceremony. Both Club teams are looking forward to next year's FLL season.
